A Word from the President: A Tribute to Kassim Koné

Some 30 years ago, as I was traveling to Mali to begin my doctoral research, I crossed paths with Barbara Frank in the Dakar airport as she was traveling back to the States after her Fulbright year.

We didn't have much time to talk, but she handed me a slip of paper with a name on it and said, "If you're looking for a research assistant, check this guy out. He's amazing!"

The name was Kassim Koné.

She was right. He was, has ever been, and will always be, amazing. Able to live in multiple worlds, translating and interpreting his own for generations of scholars and students through his assistance in the field when he was a tender youth and through his own research and scholarship as graduate student at both IU and Brandeis, and for nearly 20 years now, as a professor of anthropology at SUNY/Cortland.

He has been a member of

MANSA since its inception, and has ably served the organization continuously since 1998: first as a member of the Advisory Board, then as Vice-President to David Conrad for 7 years, and then as President for the past 6 years. He didn't break David's record, but then we hope no one ever has to!



Du Bureau de la Présidente: Hommage à Kassim Koné

Il y a 30 ans, lorsque je voyageais au Mali pour commencer ma recherche doctorale, j'ai croisé Barbara Frank à l'aéroport de Dakar comme elle voyageait aux États-Unis après son année Fulbright. Nous n'avons pas eu beaucoup de temps pour parler, mais elle m'a remis un bout de papier avec un nom écrit là-dessus et elle a dit: «Si tu es à la recherche d'un assistant, appelle ce gars. Il est incroyable!»

Le nom était Kassim Koné. Elle avait raison. Il était, a toujours été, et sera toujours, incroyable. Capable de vivre dans des mondes multiples, traduisant et interprétant le sien pour des générations de chercheurs et d'étudiants grâce à son aide sur le terrain dans sa tendre jeunesse et ensuite par sa propre recherche et érudition comme étudiant diplômé à la fois à Indiana University et Brandeis University, et maintenant depuis près de 20 ans,

Our bylaws mandate that we elect a dues-paying member in good standing who will serve as President-Elect for a three-year term, followed by another 3-year term as President. This electoral system for MANSA was designed to guarantee continuity and stability for our small, all-volunteer organization. Since we do not have a permanent office or staff, our officers are the guardians of the association. The President-Elect works closely with the President and Secretary-Treasurer, and we are delighted to welcome Joseph Hellweg as the duly elected President-Elect! Joseph Hellweg, President-Elect



I am an associate professor of religion at Florida State University with training as a cultural anthropologist and fieldwork experience in Côte d'Ivoire, Guinea, and Mali. My first book, *Hunting the Ethical State* (U. Chicago, 2011) traces the development of the *dozo* hunters' movement of Côte d'Ivoire. My second book, *Anthropologie, les premiers pas* (L'Harmattan, 2011), is an overview of ethnographic methods for francophone readers. I have published articles in *Africa*, *Africa Today*, the *Journal of the Royal Anthropological Institute*, *Migration Société* and in an edited collection by the University of Basel's African Studies Center (Lit Verlag). I have publications in press with *Annuario Antropologia*, the *Journal of Anthropology and Humanism*, and in an edited collection by Oxford University Press. My current book manuscript is a study of the songs of Ivoirian *dozo* hunters. My other current research is on the N'ko alphabet in Guinea and Mali. I have done my research in Julakan, French, and Bamanakan and also taught for a year in French at the University of Kankan, Guinea thanks to support from a Fulbright Fel-

lowship. All told, I have lived for over five years in West Africa.

As president-elect I hope to strengthen ties among our African, European, and North American members. I look forward to working with the president and secretary-treasurer to expand our membership among both professionals and students on all three continents where our members primarily reside, especially in Africa and principally through direct contact with university departments. Making our network more available as a resource for organizations seeking expertise on human rights, the environment, public health, and cultural heritage in West Africa and its diaspora is also a priority. The MANSA board could play a more active role in decisions related to all these goals and in identifying new priorities for the association.

The possibility of creating new venues for our members to exchange the results of our research also interests me—at an annual workshop organized the day before the African Studies Association meetings, for example. I would also like to pursue collaborations with our sister organiza-

tions such as CODESRIA and the West African Research Association, with which we share common interests. I am on the lookout for a European venue for our 2020 triennale conference while pursuing the possibility of Côte d'Ivoire as a location for our 2017 conference. Finally, I am grateful to MANSA for having always been a network for exchanging ideas and making friends. For all these reasons, it is a pleasure to serve MANSA as its next President-Elect.

Je suis professeur associé de religion à la Florida State University, m'étant spécialisé en anthropologie culturelle et ayant fait des enquêtes sur le terrain en Côte d'Ivoire, en Guinée et au Mali. Mon premier livre, *Hunting the Ethical State* (Univ. de Chicago, 2011) suit le développement du mouvement des chasseurs *dozo* en Côte d'Ivoire. Mon deuxième livre, *Anthropologie, les premiers pas* (L'Harmattan, 2011) est un tour d'horizon de méthodes ethnographiques pour des lecteurs francophones. J'ai publié des articles dans les revues *Africa*, *Africa Today*, le *Journal of the Royal Anthropological Institute*, *Migration Société* et

dans un volume sous la direction du Centre d'Études Africaines de l'Université de Bâle (Lit Verlag). J'ai des publications en développement ou sous presse dans les revues *Annuario Antropologia* et le *Journal of Anthropology and Humanism* et dans un volume sous la direction de Joel Robbins et Simon Coleman chez Oxford University Press. Mon manuscrit de livre actuel est une étude des chansons des *dozas* ivoiriens. Mes autres recherches actuelles concernent l'alphabet N'ko en Guinée et au Mali. J'ai fait mes recherches en dioulakan, français et bamanakan et j'ai aussi enseigné pendant une année en français à l'Université de Kankan en Guinée grâce à une bourse Fulbright. En somme j'ai passé plus de cinq ans en Afrique de l'Ouest.

En tant que président-élu je voudrais renforcer les liens entre nos membres africains, européens et nord-américains. Je suis ravi d'avoir la possibilité de travailler avec le président et le secrétaire-trésorier pour augmenter notre taux d'adhésion parmi nos collègues professionnels et étudiants sur les trois continents où résident principalement nos membres, surtout en Afrique et surtout en contactant directement des départements universitaires. Améliorer notre disponibilité en tant que réseau d'experts à d'autres organismes recherchant de l'expertise dans les domaines des droits humains, de l'environnement, de la santé publique et du patrimoine culturel en Afrique de l'Ouest et dans son diaspora est aussi une priorité. Le conseil de la MANSA pourrait jouer un rôle plus actif dans les décisions relatives à tous ces projets et en identifiant de nouvelles priorités pour l'association.

La possibilité d'organiser de nouvelles occasions où nos membres pourraient échanger les résultats de nos recherches m'intéresse aussi—telle qu'un atelier annuel tenu le jour avant la réunion de l'Association des Études Africaines, par exemple. Des collaborations seraient intéressantes à poursuivre aussi avec nos organismes frères tels que le CODESRIA et l'Association de Recherche d'Afrique de l'Ouest (WARA) avec lesquels on partage des intérêts communs. Je suis à la recherche cette année, en assistant à des conférences en Europe, d'un endroit européen où on pourrait tenir la conférence triennale en 2020. Et je suis heureux de poursuivre la possibilité de la tenir en Côte d'Ivoire en 2017 aussi vue mes liens proches avec ce pays. Enfin je suis reconnaissant à la MANSA d'avoir toujours été un réseau d'échanges et d'amitiés. Pour toutes ces raisons, il est un plaisir d'être au service de la MANSA en tant que son prochain président-élu.

MANSA NEEDS YOU TO BECOME A SPONSOR

There are not enough sponsors to cover even student-level memberships for all our sponsored members!

We currently have 122 (76%) members who are sponsored colleagues and 17 (11%) sponsored institutions.

U.S.A., and sponsoring African scholars to attend them.

For those of you who have not paid your dues for 2014 and 2015 please do so ASAP.

If you are a sponsored member and can afford to pay \$40 for a regular membership, or \$15 for a student membership (for those of you working on a degree), please consider moving from the sponsored to the regular membership.

MANSA EN BESOIN—PÉNURIE DE SPONSORS

Nous avons actuellement 122 (76%) des membres qui sont des collègues sponsorisés et 17 (11%) des institutions sponsorisées. Seulement 26 de nos membres au niveau sponsor (16%) ont payé leurs cotisations cette année, une amélioration légère sur l'année passée. Cette situation n'est pas durable. *Il n'y a pas suffisamment de sponsors pour payer la cotisation de l'ensemble de nos membres sponsorisés même au niveau étudiant.*

Nous vous prions d'envisager de devenir un sponsor pour l'année prochaine. Alors que nous préparons notre prochaine conférence internationale en 2017, nous devons renforcer nos moyens financiers. Rappelez-vous que nous n'avons pas de personnel rémunéré dans cette organisation: tout est fait sur une base volontaire par les officiers et les généreux membres qui nous aident à accomplir une variété de tâches, de sorte que tous les fonds que vous allouez contribuent à défrayer les coûts de fonc-

Report on MANSA's 9th INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE, June 18-22, 2014

Our conference in Bobo-Dioulasso, Burkina Faso, at the RAN Hotel/SOMKETA, brought together 30 scholars of Mande studies in one location for five extraordinary days of collegial sharing of research questions, theories, approaches, and methodologies, in an intimate setting. We are grateful for the generous support of our local sponsors: Dr. Alfred SANOU, Président du Conseil Régional des Hauts Bassins and M. Karim BARO, Maire de l'arrondissement 6 de Bobo Dioulasso.

The full program is available on the MANSA website under Conferences, Past Conferences: <http://mandestudies.org/past-conferences/>. There, you will find the full list of MANSA members whose generous special contributions made the conference possible, to whom we are most thankful.

The proceedings of this conference are currently being edited by Stephen Belcher and Alain Sissao for publication in the journal of the National Center of Scientific Research and Technology of Burkina Faso, *Science et Technique*.

During the conference, whose attendees were largely African members, we held an exceptional business meeting in order to better explain the workings of the association, including the finances, dues, and the system of sponsoring our members residing in Africa. After an extended and lively discussion, the participants requested a vote to approve payment of dues by all members, including those living in Africa. The results : 27 in favor, 1 against, no abstentions.

The general agreement seemed to be that all members in Africa, except students, should pay the regular dues of 20,000 FCFA per year. Students will continue to be sponsored. What remains to be worked out is a method of payment that will be workable for everyone without incurring the exorbitant fees of the usual money transfer modalities.

The officers and advisory board welcome your suggestions on this matter!

Notre conférence à Bobo-Dioulasso, au Burkina Faso, au RAN Hôtel / Somketa, a réuni une trentaine de chercheurs du monde mandé en un seul endroit pendant cinq jours extraordinaires de partage collégiale de questions de recherche, des théories, des approches et des méthodologies, dans un cadre intime. Nous sommes reconnaissants pour le soutien généreux de nos sponsors locaux: Dr Alfred SANOU, Président du Conseil Régional des Hauts Bassins et M. Karim BARO, Maire de l'arrondissement 6 de Bobo Dioulasso.

Les actes de cette conférence sont actuellement en cours d'édition par Stephen BELCHER et Alain SISSAO pour publication dans la revue du Centre national de la recherche et de la technologie du Burkina Faso, *Science et Technique*.

Lors de la conférence, dont les participants étaient largement membres africains, nous avons tenu une réunion d'affaires exceptionnelle afin de mieux expliquer le fonctionnement de l'association, y compris les finances, les cotisations, et le système de parrainer nos membres résidant en Afrique. Après une longue discussion animée, les participants ont demandé un vote pour approuver le paiement des cotisations par tous les membres, y compris ceux qui vivent en Afrique. Les résultats: 27 en faveur, 1 contre, aucune abstention.

L'accord général semble être que tous les collègues africains, à l'exception des étudiants, devraient payer des cotisations régulières de 20 000 FCFA par an. Les étudiants continueront d'être parrainés. Ce qui reste à être mis au point est une méthode de paiement qui sera viable pour tout le monde sans encourir les frais exorbitants des modalités habituelles de transfert d'argent.

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


About the journal:



MSU Archive of Malian Photography—from Candace Keller

Mali has remained the international nexus of African photography for nearly twenty years. Its capital, Bamako, is home to the only biennial festival of photography from Africa and has produced the continent's most globally renowned professional photographers.

Michigan State University, in collaboration with MATRIX: The Center for Humane Arts, Letters, and Social Sciences Online and the Maison Africaine de la Photographie in Mali, will digitize and render globally accessible the archives of the nation's most important photographers, dating from the 1940s to the present.

This two-year project, spanning May 2014–16, will address significant needs for scholarship and teaching in the humanities as well as the preservation of Mali's cultural heritage.

- Although commercial, popular, and scholarly interest in African photography has flourished over the past twenty years, access to **photographers'** studio archives is extremely limited and published materials are minimal;
- Retained in private archives, these materials are not catalogued, appropriately preserved, or internationally accessible for research and education;
- Due to the high commercial value of these archives in global markets, these materials are vulnerable to mistreatment, theft, and exploitation;
- Moreover, stored in harsh climactic conditions, the physical integrity of these collections is in serious jeopardy.

The MSU Archive of Malian Photography will digitize, catalog, preserve, and render freely accessible to a worldwide audience 100,000 rare images from the original archives of four professional photographers in Mali. Created by prominent African practitioners whose work was commissioned by private patrons as well as state governments, these images document traditional cultural and religious practices, rural festivals, early colonial developments, and processes of modernization in Ségu, Mopti, and Bamako, as the latter transitioned from a small agrar-

ian trading village into an urban center and national capital. Recording local practices from African perspectives, these visual materials contain important twentieth century representations of local aesthetics, methods of identity construction and preservation, and documentary strategies. Therefore, these primary sources are significant contributions to global histories of photography as well as historical and cultural studies of western Africa. Valuable for a wide range of audiences, from interested lay persons to photographers, scholars, and students, they benefit

teaching and research around the world across a variety of humanistic disciplines, such as history, anthropology, political science, art, aesthetics, and African studies.

To promote and preserve Mali's cultural heritage, as a result of this project, these archival collections will be protected and made freely accessible online via KORA, an open-source, database-driven, online digital repository managed by MATRIX at Michigan State University and locally available to the Malian public at the Maison Africaine de la Photographie in Bamako.

1. Kassim opened the meeting by saying that as he steps down as President he hopes that MANSA will continue to produce top-quality teachers and researches with a worldwide membership. He hopes to see the growth and quality of MANSA members on all continents continue. Another wish is that the new presidency will take the association to greater heights. With these wishes come worries because he's noticed a few problems with the association during his tenure as President. MANSA members who are professors used to recruit their undergraduate and graduate students as members, and the number of students has declined. Kassim hopes that members who teach continue to recruit their students as future members, as they will replace them someday. Kassim's heart

would be warmer if he saw more young faces from all corners of the globe at the next MANSA meeting.

2. The next item on the agenda was the report of the election of the next MANSA President-Elect. Barbara was happy to report that the sole candidate, Joseph Hellweg of Florida State University, won over fifty percent of the eligible vote. The vote was unanimous. Barbara explained that Joseph's duties at the American Academy of Religion annual meeting prevented him from attending the ASA until after 2015, but expressed her faith in his ability to lead MANSA forward as the fourth President of the MANSA Studies Association, beginning in 2017.

3. Barbara gave the treasurer's report for Dianna Bell:

An update on our membership numbers and demographics:

We currently have 103 members up to date with their memberships—this includes dues-paying and sponsored members and institutions.

Barbara reminded the group that sponsored members need to reside in Africa. We currently have 32 members who have registered as sponsored on the new website but who live outside of Africa. So Barbara asked anyone who accidentally registered as sponsored but should be paying dues to fix the error as soon as possible. Barbara also pointed to the discrepancy between sponsoring and sponsored members – these numbers should ideally be in balance and we need more members who are able to pay to become sponsoring members if we are going to maintain the system of sponsoring residents of Africa.

We have \$8,501.42 in our bank account and \$552.22 in our Paypal account. We are trying to build up funds for the next conference so that we can sponsor our African-based colleagues to come and present their research.

Barbara showed members MANSAs completely new and redesigned website, which she hopes members will use and appreciate. It's the same URL, mandestudies.org. We hope that everyone will contribute to the photo database, so please send images to Dianna Bell to be included in the rotating photographs on the homepage. We have our history, bylaws, information on past conference, and all newsletters are archived in PDF form starting with #1 and going up through the most recent.

Barbara showed members how to register and up-

date their information through the website by going to "Membership" and then clicking on "Update Profile," which in the future we'll change to say "Join." Barbara pointed out the feature that you can set it up through the site to have your membership dues taken out as a recurring option each year. Barbara encouraged members to send any suggestions for changing the website to her before the end of December.

Since last December we've had a new payment system set up for members through the Mande Studies website. This site is as secure as any similar site that you use for paying professional dues. This year the treasurer has been flexible with processing payments that have come in directly from Paypal (bypassing our site) or by check, but Dianna would like to phase this out in the coming year and require all members to pay and maintain their profiles on the MANSAs site. If you don't want to use Paypal then let the treasurer know so that she can give you an alternate method for paying dues. We would prefer to not accept personal checks any longer. Also, please fill out all the information asked for in the online form – including the country where you live. This will help to ensure that we have complete addresses for mailing out journals. Dianna and Barbara have put in a lot of work to set up the site, so we hope to see members use it and help to make MANSAs membership work through a more automated system.

Barbara reminded the group of the dues levels, which have not changed:

Regular and institutional membership dues are \$40 per year and include *Mande Studies* (our journal).

Sponsoring memberships are \$60 per year and include *Mande Studies*.

Full student memberships are \$30 and include *Mande Studies*.

Basic student memberships (excluding *Mande Studies*) are \$15 per year.

4. Next, attendees heard a report from Peter Mark, who remarkably put out three issues of the journal in one year. Peter addressed related issues, most of which have to do with the journal going online in one form or another, and the last deals with ensuring that we not fall behind again. Starting with the latter, we are **now up to date, but that's not going to stay fixed unless Peter starts receiving more submissions. Right now we're empty on submissions and there won't be new issues until we receive more papers.** Peter made a plea for people to rework papers or find old papers that they could potentially submit. Peter assured members that the submission process is swift in comparison to other journals. Those who presented at the Bobo-Dioulasso conference should especially think about sending in their papers for consideration. We like to include in each issue submissions from both junior and senior scholars.

The other issues discussed relate to electronics. We would like to make the journal available online, which would make the journal more attractive for potential submissions. Peter has been in contact with JSTOR and their social science editor. Others have suggested that we use Project Muse, but it seems that more people use JSTOR as a preferred digital library.

As an update, Peter Mark announ-

ced following the meeting through email that he met with Neil Kodesh of African Studies Publications at Wisconsin (our publisher) and with the editorial team for the University of Wisconsin Press. Neil had promised that if our journal could catch up on back issues, the University Press would take over as publisher. With three issues in the last 6 months, we have now caught up and *the University of Wisconsin Press will henceforth publish Mande Studies*. This is a huge step up for Mande Studies; distribution will be improved, the journal will be produced on heavier and more durable paper, and starting with the next issue, volume 16, we will immediately be online to all subscribers.

In addition, the University of Wisconsin Press has taken over negotiations to get us onto JSTOR. And current issues will be available on Project Muse. So, we are now digital and in the Big League.

Special thanks are due to each of you who have provided manuscripts over the past two years. *Very special thanks also to Stephen Belcher, who played a critical role in producing volume 15 so quickly but refused any written recognition in volume 15 for all the work he did.*

To move forward, however, Peter needs your help! We do not have enough manuscripts currently to even begin to produce

the next issue. He is soliciting your papers (from ASA, from the conference last June). It is important that the first issue in our new format with the University of Wisconsin Press be of high quality, but only members can make this possible. Please send your manuscripts to pmark@wesleyan.edu.

5. Planning for our next MANSA international conference, which will be our tenth meeting, is now underway. Barbara asked for member input: where it should be held, possible links to universities that could help to host the meeting. Our new incoming President-Elect might like to see it happen **in Cote d'Ivoire, and Jeanne Toungara** said that would be nice but that we need to identify supporting infrastructure as soon as possible. She volunteered to help with this.

6. Barbara asked members to send her ideas of possible panels topics for the ASA as soon as possible. This year and in years past **we've only had one MANSA panel.** Barbara hopes that next year we can have at least two, especially because in previous years we've had as many as four or five. So Barbara hopes for more MANSA activity going on in the program for the ASA. If you have panel ideas that need developing then send them to Barbara, Dianna, or Joseph.

The three musicians of Trio Da Kali hail from the Mande culture of West Africa, from a heritage of distinguished griots. Long-term collaborators, the artists aim to bring to the forefront neglected repertoires and performance styles of the griots, celebrating some of the African continent’s finest, most subtle and sublime music. The format of the trio recreates the kind of ensemble that would have been heard in Mali’s pre-colonial times.

Lassana Diabaté is originally from Guinea and is one of Africa’s greatest *balafon* (22-key xylophone) players, an astonishing virtuoso. Hawa Kassé Mady Diabaté, the singer of the Trio, is the daughter of leading traditional vocalist Kassé Mady, and great niece of Sira Mory Diabaté, from whom she has inherited a powerful and expressive voice and a lyrical repertoire. The youngest member of the group, Mamadou Kouyaté, plays bass *ngoni* (lute) and brings to it the talent and creativity of his father, award-winning world music star Bassekou Kouyaté. Trio Da Kali were created in 2013 in order to take part in a collaboration with the world-famous Kronos Quartet, which debuted in the USA in February 2014, to great critical acclaim, and will be recorded later this year.

Catherine P. Foster, Ph.D., Cultural Property Analyst: The U.S. [Cultural Property Advisory Committee met January 21-23, 2015](#) to, among other business, conduct an interim review of the cultural property bilateral agreement between the United States and the Republic of Mali. This agreement, in place since 1997, places U.S. import restrictions on categories of archaeological material from Mali dating between the Paleolithic Era and approximately the mid-18th century. The import restriction is intended to reduce the incentive for pillage and illicit trafficking of cultural objects. The agreement also fosters opportunities for Mali

to further the regulatory, institutional, and educational measures it has already initiated, such as developing procedures for the inventory and classification of cultural property and creating cultural missions to encourage local populations to safeguard sites against pillage, making them available for scientific excavation and public appreciation.
