# Foreign Scholars to be at ASA Meeting in Baltimore

This year's MANSA application to the International Visitors Program Committee of the African Studies Association requesting travel funds was made on behalf of Mamadou Diawara of the Frobenius Institut. The request was approved, and Dr. Diawara will attend the 1990 meeting in Baltimore. His additional U.S. engagements will include visits to Indiana University, the University of Wisconsin-Madison and Northwestern University.

Thanks to the efforts of Marie Perinbam, the International Visitors Program Committee of the ASA has also generously agreed to provide accommodation in Baltimore for our members from the Soviet Union, Konstantin Pozdnákov of the Academy of Sciences in Leningrad, and Valentin Vydrine of Leningrad University. In a letter to D. Conrad dated 10 August, 1990 they reported that they had succeeded in acquiring their tickets to the U.S.A., that they would arrive in Washington D.C. on October 27, and that we can expect to see them in Baltimore. Their additional U.S. engagements will include visits to the University of Florida and Indiana University.
