To: North American Members Concerning a Visit to the United States by Our Members in the Soviet Union

Two new members of MANSA, Konstantin Pozdnákov of the Institute of Ethnology, Academy of Sciences, and Valentin Vydrine of Leningrad University have expressed interest in attending the ASA meeting in Baltimore. Their institutions will pay for their transportation to the United States. What they need from MANSA is help in lining up an itinerary of academic engagements at various universities that would cover their travel and accommodation expenses while in the U.S.A.

Professors Pozdnåkov and Vidrine both specialize in Mande linguistics. In addition to the titles of their proposed ASA papers, they list eighteen other topics (nine each) on which they are prepared to speak. Reading Bank

It has occurred to me that MANSA members could serve each other better by insitutionalizing a more or less "Readers' Program," or some such thing (the name is unimportant at this stage), where members' manuscripts would be informally reviewed — given the areas of expertise — before submitting them to a journal or a press. Program Readers — a number as yet undetermined and doubtless changing perhaps on a quarterly, semester, six monthly, or yearly basis — would also, if they wish, serve as referees for jobs and grant applications, as well as promotions, etc. People involved in on—going research are usually in need of the latter, and drawing on a personal network of friends may not always be convenient. Readers who agree to review a manuscript could be asked to render their suggestions within a time agreed upon in advance. To be a Reader in some such "Readers' Program" would of course have to be absolutely voluntary, and the decision to read or not to read any particular manuscript would rest entirely with the Reader. The names and addresses of Readers could be published on a quarterly, six monthly or yearly basis in the MANSA newsletter.
